Dear all,

Welcome to our Courage 1 News Magazine. We have seen the return of trips and visits, as well as preparations starting for our House Summer Sports Championships and first House Festival next half term.

The last six weeks have also seen our Year 11s and 13s engaging with a huge amount of intensive work for their final GCSE and A Level work. Whilst not the normal exam season this year, the amount of work produced by our pupils - ably supported and assessed by CFS teachers - has been highly impressive. We have wished both cohorts a fond farewell today, and we are looking forward to celebrating properly with them next month at the Year 11 Prom and Year 13 Leavers' Meal, as well as seeing them in August for the all important results days.

EYFS

This term has been a busy one with a super start to our learning journey. We couldn't believe it when the Evil Pea had crept into our classrooms and caused mischief! Our focus text 'Supertato' was a big hit with lots of imaginative play, writing speech bubbles for the characters in the books and even writing lists of equipment for superheroes. The children's writing is coming on well with many now starting to write sentences independently. This is great to see and our main target for the end of the year.

We are now focusing on facts and have been learning about worms using the book 'Yucky Worms'. We even have a wormery in the classroom!

We have been learning lots in Maths too, with a particular focus on teen numbers, doubling numbers and sharing. Our knowledge on number bonds and addition is growing and lots of us have enjoyed exploring number sentences (sums) and working out the answers using concrete objects, tens frames and number patterns.

As we progress through to the end of the term, we will continue to immerse the children into outdoor learning with plenty of opportunities for planting, building, growing and of course Forest School. We have been helping Jen develop the Forest School area and have enjoyed using the tools to dig for worms (for our wormery), plant out trees, potatoes and flowers and create a herb garden. Our favourite things to do at Forest School are: playing in the mud kitchen, swinging in the hammocks, taking turns on the swing, digging, planting, making things with Jen and of course drinking hot chocolate and toasting marshmallows on the fire!

Year 1

Year 2

In Year 2 our topic has been 'Little Gardeners' and we have been learning all about plants and growth. We have been doing lots of planting both in the classroom and developing our Forest School area. We have been developing our art skills and focusing on using clay to make tiles with flower designs. We have been using mapwork skills in Geography and making salads whilst also thinking about healthy eating and healthy living. This has linked well to PE where we have been working on our athletic skills ready for (fingers crossed) Sports Day! We have really enjoyed this topic and although the weather hasn't always been on our side, seeing the change in seasons and new life in plants has provided a positive start to the Summer term.







Years 3 and 4

Years 3 and 4 have focused their learning around the topic of Egypt this term. This has provided a plethora of learning opportunities that all the children have really enjoyed, particularly as they have been so hands on, providing that memorable learning experience that children thrive on. This has included mummifying tomatoes, making death masks and using clay to make canopic jars! Fascinating! Linking writing into the topic, the pupils have really enjoyed their focus text 'The Secrets of a Sun King' and have been writing instructions on how to mummify a Pharaoh. The final pieces of writing and art creations that have come out of this topic have really impressed the teachers — it's great that this amazing topic has hooked our young minds of Year 3 and 4!







Years 5 and 6

This half term in Years 5 and 6 we have brushed off our tunics and donned our leather sandals and stepped back in time to Ancient Greece! We have thoroughly enjoyed exploring the highs and lows of the immortal world through our amazing class text 'Who Let the Gods Out' by Maz Evans and have written various pieces of writing to accompany it, such as our own modern Greek God/Goddess descriptions, retellings of key chapters and a comic strip! We have also delved into other various aspects of the Ancient Greeks such as replicating artwork, exploring the daily life of various citizens, dressing up in traditional clothing styles, and even researching the unusual eating habits they once had. Sixth Form



Every student has risen to the different challenges' subjects have presented them exceptionally well; all have knuckled down, worked tirelessly in the study room and taken personal responsibility for what they have needed to do. Staff have placed the bar rightly high, have set and marked pieces of work to allow grading decisions to be fair and accurate, alongside delivering high quality teaching so that students feel they can make it. This half term has been very different to what a 'usual' half term would normally be like, but oddly satisfying as it has brought out the best from many.

Our last 'half term' looks to be very different again! Maths

There is definitely a buzz around Maths at CFS at the moment! We have been so impressed with how all of our children have engaged with Maths, both during our time at home and upon the return to school.

Year 1 have been busy exploring arrays, introducing them to the idea of multiplication. They have now moved on to dividing numbers, looking at using both equal groups and sharing equally.

Year 2 have been superstars when tackling a tricky concept – telling the time! They have been learning o'clock, half past, quarter to and quarter past. Some have even mastered counting in 5s to tell the time to 5 minutes!

Year 3 have had lots of fun exploring Geometry. They have been measuring in cm and mm, and learning about the different types of angles (right, acute, obtuse) and lines (horizontal, vertical, parallel and perpendicular).

Amazingly, Year 6 have covered all of the Primary curriculum and are busy revising key concepts. After half term, they will be looking at MoneySense, an educational programme to help develop their understanding of money in the real world.

English

In Year 1, we have been learning about using as and like to write similes. Thinking about our book, The Bog Baby, we applied our new simile skills to write character descriptions and descriptions on the magical pond where he lives. The children have been working really hard to develop their phonic knowledge. They have loved completing phonic obstacle courses, splat the word and find the hidden word in cups.

This term in Year 2, we have explored the text Fantastically Great Women Who Changed the World. The children enjoyed combining their History, Geography and writing skills to produce a non-fiction piece, all about famous American aviator Amelia Earhart. The children have also explored Traction Man, by developing their inference skills and writing character descriptions. We then read The Secret Sky Garden, and the children wrote setting descriptions of contrasting settings in the book using similes to describe.

Years 3 and 4 we have been reading 'Secrets of a Sun King' by Emma Carroll. We have been developing our vocabulary skills by exploring the meaning of new words we come across in the text. For our writing focus, we have created instructions detailing how to mummify a Pharaoh, using a variety of determiners. We have also written a newspaper report recounting the discovery of Tutankhamun's tomb.

In Years 5 and 6 the children have embraced Greek mythology by reading the text Who Let the Gods Out? The children have used the text to explore different genres. They wrote an action narrative, a romantic comic strip, a comedic playscript and a humorous riddle. The children have enjoyed manipulating language to evoke different feelings within their reading.









English

This term, our Year 9 pupils have studied how William Blake uses language and structure to create meaning in his poem 'A Poison Tree' [1794]. They have then used their knowledge and understanding of Blake's poem as impetus for writing their own. They have been highly successful in using poetic devices and following the rhythm and rhyming pattern of the original poem. The extended metaphor of the tree remains but the negative tone is inverted. The pupils have taken the darkness, anger and vengeance replacing it with light and love. The theme is no longer the end of friendship but the strength of relationships.






Science


Year 10 French have been working on Imperative verbs (instructions) and have been labelling some useful things around the room.






