Principal's Message

Dear all,

Welcome to another full CFS news magazine. I am delighted to share with you some of the wonderful things that have been going on in school since Christmas. It has been a very difficult half term in many respects – with very high staff absence due to Covid and of course many pupils still being affected too – but this makes the following pages even more of a celebration; despite everything, the staff and pupils at CFS have really thrown themselves into so much this half term. The re-emergence of sports fixtures and events, our first residential for a very long time, trips, enrichment visits, House events, and of course a continued focus on learning in the classroom and preparation for external tests and exams.

Over the next few pages you will see updates about the House competition now we have reached half way through the year. All is still to play for between the four Houses! Year 1

This half term we have been on a journey around the world. We have visited each of the seven continents and learnt about their famous landmarks, the animals that live there and some interesting facts. Year 2

In Year 2, we kicked our Justice 1 work off with a visit from The Reptylers. We spent a wonderful morning looking closely at and handling lots of different reptiles as well as Charlotte the tarantula! We learned about where they live and what they like to eat. We all had a wonderful time and lots of us overcame our fears and held or stroked the reptiles.

In both Geography and Science, we have been looking at different climates in our world and the habitats of some of the animals that are on our planet. We created dioramas to show the different habitats and added animals that live in them.





Lower Key Stage 2

In Years Three and Four we have been learning about our Extreme Earth - volcanoes, avalanches, earthquakes, extreme weather and also learning more about climate change. We have been inspired by the book 'Earth Shattering Events' and this has led us to investigate the layers of the Earth. We are using our knowledge to create a website all about a topic of our choice which we will share on Google Classroom soon.







Upper Key Stage 2

This term we have been reading the book 'Street Child' and learning all about the Victorian era. Years 5 and 6 took a trip to the Weald and Downland Museum where they experienced what their childhood would have been like in the Victorian era. They went to Victorian school, learnt about Victorian household chores and even ate some drop scones fresh from the fire!

Our learning back at school has been all about the Victorians too - we've been learning about Victorian inventors and important Victorian figures. Ask about Thomas Barnardo and his work and legacy! We have also started our Forest School sessions, where we have built forts, learnt how to light an outside fire and even toasted marshmallows around it.

They are proud to be completing more challenges


They are proud to be scoring higher on their Year 6 arithmetic


Year 1 have been building on their number knowledge to count all the way up to 50, while Year 2 have been exploring, sorting, and identifying 2D and 3D shapes.

In Lower Key Stage 2, Year 3 have been exploring money. From recognising coins to calculating how much change they would get from £10 notes, they have been superstars at solving problems. In Year 4, the children have been using their times table knowledge to multiply and divide larger numbers.

In Upper Key Stage 2, Year 5 have also been looking at fractions using a variety of models to help them. Year 6 have been exploring the relationships between decimals, fractions, and percentages and using this to solve problems. Additionally, they have been using data to create graphs on Google Sheets as part of our topic work around Australia. Take a look at these graphs made by Kitty (Yr5) and Baylee (Yr6).

Maths


Secondary

Welcome to 2022. A new year has hit us and the Maths department are running with it.

Year 7 have carried on where they left off with pupils showing real promise and determination when solving Maths problems in class. Even with staff absences in January pupils used their maths to solve the ultimate problem "the apprentice." Run by Sir (Alan) Green, pupils had to use a variety of skills in a range of problem-solving activities.

Year 8 have been doing some solid work looking at Pythagoras and as a result some excellent pictures are shown below demonstrating this.





Year 9 have undertaken the Intermediate Maths Challenge 2022 which we are still waiting on their placement regionally.

Year 10 are carrying the Maths flag mid-way through the term getting ready for some assessments that they have coming up and learning everything Trig. They also undertook the Senior Maths Challenge, again results to be confirmed.

Year 11 have taken their mock results well and are now specifically focused in on smaller skills that will help them reach their targets to enable them to take their next steps into further education or work. The Maths team have given each pupil specific areas of subject knowledge to ensure every pupil goes into the exams prepared to succeed.

English

It has been a very busy half term in Primary, with lots of exciting learning experiences taking place. Here is a little flavour of what has been happening...

In Year 1, the children have continued to develop their understanding of adjectives, whilst also exploring and using the conjunctions 'and' and 'because' in their writing. Question marks have also been a focus this half term, with the children using them to make their writing more exciting. The key text 'Introducing Antarctica' has been used as a stimulus to help the children develop their questioning skills, which helped with writing letters to a scientist about the impact of global warming on the Antarctic. The children have also been reading 'One Day on Our Blue Planet...In the Savannah' to inspire acrostic poems about Africa.

In their learning experience 'What a Wonderful World', Year 2 have been reading 'The Lonely Beast' and 'Where the Wild Thing Are'. They have looked at character description as well as story writing. The children created their own Beasts and wrote an adventure story for them, as well as creating a class mix and match book of their own Wild Things.

In Years 3 and 4, the children have been delving deep into all things weather, looking at everything from earthquakes to tsunamis. The children have created their own narratives about the journey of a pebble, generated information pages about climate change and have designed their own websites based around an example of extreme weather that fascinates them.

The children in Years 5 and 6 have been busy creating non-chronological pieces of writing about children in Victorian times, as well as narratives leading on from chapter 8 in their focus text 'Street Child' where the hero escapes from the workhouse. They have also been busy creating some interesting cross-curricular fact pages in their topic sessions, including a fascinating page all about blood.

Creative Arts

On the very cold morning of 12 February 2022, Isla Kavanagh Brown, Tammy-Marie Goddard, their families and CFS friends as well as Miss Pye had an early start with a long drive up to Merton College, London. Isla and Tammy were representing CFS and Chichester as finalists in the Young Chef Of the Year Competition 2022. Six secondary school pupils from across the South came to the event to see who's three course meal, health and hygiene, chef styling and set up would be crowned this year's Young Chef of the Year 2022.

Pupils had two hours to create and plate their dishes with four judges, all of who are Head Chefs/or Chef Managers, watching everything they did. Tammy's dishes were creamy cheese mushrooms on a bed of homemade Italian herbed bread, Italian prosciutto wrapped chicken on a bed of lentils and spinach and an apricot fool dessert. Isla's dishes were smoked savoury bread and butter pudding with antipasti, hassleback aubergine, ricotta and marinara stuffed mushrooms with tomato sauce and deconstructed strawberry and gin mascarpone tart.

It was a very tough competition and with new kitchen set ups for all, it was a very different experience. After two hours, judges' deliberation and final decisions made, everyone was called into the presentation room for the announcements. The judges said all the dishes were to an extremely high standard with lots of innovation and creative thinking being displayed. They were very impressed with the level of hygiene used and the logical order that dishes were made in.

Isla came First and has been given the honour of bringing the 'Rose Bowl Cup' to CFS for this year! She scored in the top sections as well getting high commendations for her starter and dessert. Tammy collected the Second place trophy and was the youngest chef in the event. She scored in the top sections and got high commendations for her main and dessert.

We are so proud of Isla and Tammy. Miss Pye, Food Tech Teacher who watched the event stated "Both young ladies were extremely calm and did so well with the pressure of the event. They have been working so hard throughout this term to get to where they are now and the hard work has certainly paid off. It was wonderful to see their family and friends who, after COVID restrictions were eased, have been allowed back in to support the event. The judges gave such wonderful feedback about both pupils, one stating they would happily have both of them in his kitchen and another saying they could easily see their dishes in a high class restaurant. I am proud as punch for both of them and hope they celebrate this amazing achievement. A huge well done Isla and Tammy! I can't wait to see what is created next year."

Design Technology

Year 7 Design and Technology pupils have been submitting some wonderful ideas and models for their **Why Hasn't it Been Invented Yet?** homework:

Arthur made this superb model of a garden table and chairs with inbuilt BBQ, and demonstrated how he had modified a series of prototypes before coming up with his final design. Lee designed a multi-purpose fire extinguisher with three different chambers which could be used to put out electrical fires, non electrical fires and electrical fires caused by wires in the mains. Harry modelled a giant geo dome that would go over cities with PVC over carbon fibre poles to break down pollution using an air filtration system. We are really impressed by the ingenuity shown by our Year 7 pupils and by the quality of their model making. We hope to be able to share further examples next time.

Meanwhile other Year 7 pupils have been practising their woodwork skills, cutting out and finishing Pacman characters using hand tools and the belt sander. With these new skills in mind they are now moving onto designing trinket boxes and we look forward to sharing the results of this project soon.


School Houses

The PE Bake Sale raised just over £280.


