### EYFS

What a fantastic start to the children's very first year of school. They have all settled in very well and we appreciate your support with our new procedures to keep everyone safe.

Our learning journey started with our 'All about me' topic. We have enjoyed learning about the five senses; this included using our senses in various different ways during our exploring time. We painted self portraits, focusing on colour mixing and created skeletons using black paper and chalk. We discussed the different heights of the children in the classes and what unique traits make us special. The children have really bonded with each other and the teachers. They are all great at coming into school independently and have coped well with the longer days over the past couple of weeks.

School dinners have been a hit! As has Forest school where we have enjoyed playing with clay, exploring the Forest school area, playing hide and seek, making dens and of course hot chocolate and marshmallows on the fire!

Towards the end of the term we focused on the book 'We're Going On A Bear Hunt'. The children loved making maps for the bear hunt including all the elements from the story, making bear caves and of course our Teddy Bear's picnic! The children loved making sandwiches and picnicking in the hall!

We are all very proud of our new intake of lovely pupils. They have achieved so much already and we look forward to a fantastic year.







#### Year 1

Our topic this half term, 'My Amazing Body' has been heavily linked to our Science learning. We have used dog biscuits to make a diagram of the human skeleton, tasted different foods, smelled yummy and less desirable smells and described them by using our sense of touch. In English we have been recapping what skills we need to use to write a simple sentence and have written a letter to our class visitor 'Beegu' to convince her to come back and visit again. In Maths we have recapped our previous learning about place value with numbers from zero to ten and begun to look at addition and subtraction.

In our other subjects, we investigated colour mixing which allowed us to create realistic selfportraits, learnt about algorithms in computing, basic movements, shapes and rolls in PE and compared our childhood to the Victorian times.

It has been a very busy half term, the children have all been amazing and enthusiastically joined in with all learning opportunities, including those in our new outdoor area.



#### Year 2

We have had a great half term learning all about castles. We had an amazing dress up day, explored castles through the ages, used iPads to research real life castles and created some amazing dragon eyes as part of our art. We've also enjoyed using our Forest School area and developing the site by building a bug hotel together.





#### Years 3 & 4

This half term we have been exploring all things related to the Tropical Rainforest. The children have particularly enjoyed studying the artwork of Henri Rousseau. We have experimented with dry materials looking closely at light and shadow to create our own imitations of his most famous pieces. To end our topic, we are creating 'exploding' fact books with information about the animals we have learnt and showcase some of our art skills.

In PE we have been copying and rehearsing travelling movements across space to be able to perform, using floor patterns to help tell a story. The children have performed to music to show the hunting behaviour of a snake and described that movement with accuracy.

To conclude our topic of the Rainforest, Years 3 and 4 have worked hard on their 'exploding' fact books. We have combined English, Geography, Science and Art to present facts and drawings about a sloth, a jaguar and a red-eyed tree frog. We think they look brilliant!



#### Years 5 & 6

Science - this half term we have been looking at space. Having completed some research on the sizes and distances between the planets we then compared their relative sizes to pieces of fruit. We discovered that Jupiter (the largest planet) was the size of a small watermelon whereas Mercury (the smallest planet) resembled a small peppercorn. The children made an orrery in small groups showing the position of the planets in the solar system on that particular day. They are hanging in the classrooms. We have also looked at the phases of the moon again showing that during the week we discovered that the moon was a waning gibbous. The only way to really understand this is to use Oreo cookies to resemble the different phases - it was the quickest lesson to clean up after!

#### Years 5 & 6

In our Design and Technology lessons, we have been creating a model solar system. To do this we have decorated a backing piece to represent the galaxy and have created the planets in our solar system using papier mâché. We have thoroughly enjoyed getting messy in our afternoons!

We have also created art inspired by Peter Thorpe's Abstract art which linked to their final outcomes in writing.

In music this half term, the pupils begun by exploring the 'Planets' suite composed by Gustav Holst. Moving on from this, they have been exploring the use of body percussion to produce musical sounds. They have also looked at the structure of music and used this to compose their very own body percussion songs.



#### Year 7

It has been truly wonderful welcoming this cohort of Year 7 pupils to CFS. I would like to praise the pupils for a smooth transition and excellent resilience to their new Secondary school life, despite many new and different challenges. In only a couple of weeks we have formed a Year 7 School Council, we have supported Young Minds in our Wear Yellow Day and we have had music performances in assembly. I am really looking to seeing what Year 7 can achieve in the next half term.

### Sixth Form

### Maths

With the new term upon us, the Maths department has cranked up the gears and unleashed a new starter from the minute pupils walk into the classroom. Years 7 and 8 have been given the specific mission of learning the secret art of Numeracy Ninjas. 30 questions in five minutes.

With Challenges such as Mental Strategies, Times-table and Key skills, pupils have had to navigate through and try to reach the ultimate goal of becoming a Black Belt. This is no easy task as each session the questions get harder forcing the young ninjas to try even harder and delve deeper into their maths knowledge.

What is the value of 13 squared?

If a= 4, b= 3 and c= 1, what is the value of 3a- 2b?

### English



#### Year 1

Beegu by Alexis Deacon has been Year Ones key text this half-term. They have been working very hard to use capital letters and full stops consistently in their written work. It has been great to watch their confidence grow as writers, as they share their creative ideas.

#### Year 2

Year 2 have been exploring Rapunzel and George and the Dragon as their key texts. The children have enjoyed an immersive experience into their new topic by enjoying a dress-up day. Feeling inspired, the children applied their new knowledge of expanded nouns phases to write an informative letter.

#### Years 3 and Year 4

The Great Kapok Tree by Lynne Cherry launched the children into learning about the rainforest. The children have been working hard to revise their knowledge of subjects and verbs in a main clause and how to use a range of coordinating conjunctions in multiclause sentences. They have each created an exploding book which are full of rainforest animal facts.


#### Years 5 and Year 6

The pupils have been focusing on the book Cosmic by Frank Cottrell Boyce. They have used the book to write in several different forms. These include diary entries, theme park descriptions and a description of space. The children have revised sentence structures, conjunctions, adverbials and semi-colons. They enjoyed listening to David Bowie's space themed songs to inspire their writing.

## English

This term we have been learning about Shakespeare's famous play "A Midsummer Night's Dream." We have studied the themes of the story, the four different plots, the characters and what their roles are. Also we found out about the Shakespearean view on the world and how it is 'split' into three parts, the old world, the green world, and the new world. We researched the mysteries inside the green world. To further show our understanding of the play, we have written descriptions of the green world, created our own storyboards of the main events and freeze frames.

All in all, this has been an exciting experience and we have left this topic with further knowledge of Shakespeare.

As always it has been an amazing seven weeks at CFS and were really looking forward to seeing all of our pupils back for the next part of the term, ready and raring to go.




### Pegasus




