#### Year 1

This term Year 1 have been learning about the circus. We had our circus skills workshop where we tried lots of different skills, including juggling, plate spinning and feather balancing. In History we created a circus history timeline and then junk modelled a circus in small groups. In Science we learnt all about materials. We sorted objects into different materials, thought about their properties and completed some experiments using magnets. In Geography we learnt about the UK and created some fantastic models of different castles and paintings of the national flowers. In computing we learnt about algorithms and created our own for activities like getting ready for school and making pizza.

For Design Technology, we received a letter from Santa explaining that his elves had gone on holiday and he needed some help. We decided that we would be Santa's elves and make some toys to send to the North Pole. We looked at some moving toys before designing them and going over to use the Design Technology rooms in Secondary to make them. We have also learnt about the Christmas story and made nativity scenes, acted it out and drew some lovely pictures.



#### Year 2

This half term Year 2 have been learning about the city of London in our topic called 'Bright Lights, Big City'. In History and Geography, the children have been learning about the landmarks of London, the key events of The Gunpowder Plot and The Great Fire of London. The children had also been comparing the festivals of Eid and Christmas, how they are celebrated and why. In Computing, the children have been exploring what the terms algorithm and debugging



mean and using them with Beebots and Scratch. In Art the children have been using different media to create drawings for their guide books in English.

### Lower Key Stage 2

'We are artists' has been a super term for Years 3 and 4! We have been surrounded by learning about artists including the work of illustrators Sam Usher and Sydney Smith and the famous, Frida Kahlo. The children have been excited to imitate their drawing and painting techniques, focusing on shapes, lines and perspective. Year 3 and 4 have shown they are young artists and have produced wonderful artwork to go alongside their various pieces of writing, including a poem, narrative and biography. Recently, we were lucky enough to visit New Park cinema where the children watched snippets of the Disney film 'Fantasia' and produced storyboards in groups. Walking to and from Chichester was chilly but the children enjoyed representing CFS with pride.

Across the curriculum, the children have worked hard, particularly focusing on times tables, learning new tables, practicing speed and taking part in some class rivalry too. Year 3 have enjoyed exploring light sources and reflection in Science and Year 4 look forward to learning about sound and vibrations after the festive break. Goodbye and good luck to Miss Kerry. 






### Upper Key Stage 2

#### Year 7


It has been busy half term for Year 7; Science museum trip, fixture opportunities, Shakespeare Rap Battles in English, Anti-Bullying Week and many more activities.

## Maths

### Secondary

Christmas has come round again and what a first term.

Year 7 have come in and are up and running on their Maths Journey. It has been a real pleasure to witness them learning new topics with their new teachers. The level of focus is high and the pupils are showing some strong signs which is very encouraging.

Year 8 have been doing some solid work looking at linear sequences and as a result they have produced some excellent pieces of work and assessments.

Year 9 are getting ready to undertake the intermediate challenge and have been looking at linear and quadratic graphs, along with simultaneous equations to get prepared.

Year 10 are starting to settle into the GCSE way of life realising how important Maths is in future careers and college opportunities and are developing the necessary problem-solving skills to help them succeed.

Year 11's have just taken their mock exams well and when they get back after Christmas will be specifically focussing on smaller skills that will help them reach their targets to enable them to take their next steps into further education or work. The Maths team have given each pupil specific areas of subject knowledge to focus on so that every pupil goes into the exams prepared to succeed.

### **Christmas Maths problems**

- Santa, Rudolph and the Snowman share 42 sweets in the ratio 3 : 2 : 1 Work out the number of sweets that each of them receives.
- Santa's Elves are making Christmas cookies. They mix flour, butter and sugar in the ratio 6:4:1.
- The Elves uses 160 grams of butter. Work out how much flour and sugar the elves use.
- Santa's toy machine fills 1000 sacks with toys in 5 hours. Work out how many hours it would take to fill 1200 sacks.

## English

In **Year 1**, the children have built on their skills from last half term. Using the key skills of capital letters, finger spaces and full stops, the children have made their sentences more interesting using adjectives. After their circus skills day, the children were able to apply their prior knowledge to their writing, using adjectives to describe different parts and acts of the circus.

In **Year 2**, the children have been looking at our key texts 'The Lonely Beast' and 'The Hackney Martian'. The children have created a letter of invitation from the beast to the people in the city to come to his garden to say thank you for making him feel so welcome. Using commas in lists, the children included all the lovely food and activities that they would do at the party. Max the Martian needed help to tell all his alien friends about London, so the children have created guidebooks containing key facts about some of the landmarks, using both coordinating and subordinating conjunctions to join the clauses together.

It has been a busy half term in **Lower Key Stage 2**! In their first learning journey linked to their 'We Are Artists' topic, the children of Year 3 and Year 4 unpicked and analysed the work of the famous poet Joseph Coelho, before creating their own poems using prepositions to help communicate the metaphorical journey of their gratitude as it passed in and around the city of Chichester. The children also had a go at writing their own narratives, taking inspiration from the wordless picture book 'Footpath Flowers'. To help bring their stories to life, the children explored how to use fronted adverbials to help add interest to their writing. In the final few weeks of term, the children have enjoyed learning about the famous artist Frida Kahlo, using her thought-provoking life as inspiration for their own biographies.

In **Upper Key Stage 2** the children have been reading the book 'Ice Trap: Shackleton's Incredible Expedition' by Meredith Hooper. Before reading, the children used their retrieval skills to research information about Antarctica to discover why these expeditions were so gruelling for the crews who ventured there. Then, they used this knowledge to write non-chronological reports about this fascinating continent. Once they had read the book, the children developed their persuasive writing techniques by producing an advert to encourage adventurous folk to explore Antarctica. Year 5 then produced some poetry inspired by Shackleton's story while Year 6 wrote a magazine-style interview which shared the story of Aron Ralston – the man who amputated his own arm when he became trapped between two boulders in a canyon!

## English

Recently in our English lesson we have been studying poetry. At the moment we are learning about the nonsense poem, *The Jabberwocky*. It is full of fun, with weird and dark themes.

We have analysed poems that range from devastating war to *The Jabberwocky* poem that is full of nonsense and made-up words but they still create and hold meaning. The Jabberwocky is very hard to decipher as the poet came up with new words to describe the creatures featured in the poem.


We have been asked to create a puppet show using our imaginations to come up with what these creatures could be, or what they look like. We have drawn them ourselves and made the puppets. Everyone will be reading out the poem and performing it in front of the class using their puppet creations to bring the poem to life.

One thing we have learnt when it comes to reading poems is that you should look past what it seems to be talking about and get your brain in gear to find the deeper meanings. We have learnt that poems are not just short stories; they have deep meanings showing hidden stories in what often seem to be simple pieces of writing.

As part of Protect Our Planet Day, during Science lessons, pupils had the opportunity to link up live with researchers in Antarctica and listen to interviews with the producers of Frozen Planet.



The Sleigh Race brief was to design and make a sleigh out of recycled materials. The sleigh needed to travel 5 metres and be no bigger than 40cm long. There were lots of very inventive designs for the sleigh racing - some on wheels, some battery powered and some even flew!

With some very close races, and lots of fun, everyone was a winner!

### **Creative Arts**

During November Year 10 and Year 11 GCSE DT pupils enjoyed investigation days exploring how a range of materials and equipment can be used to inform and improve their product design options.

The workshop was a hive of activity for two days with pupils sampling upholstery skills, the strip heater, vacuum forming, the bag press, metal clay, methods for strengthening textiles, different finishes, laser cutting and 3D printing. Mrs Halton got stuck in too, creating a mini version of herself using copper clay!

The sessions inspired pupils to try new methods when developing their products, and will encourage them to think outside of the box when looking for solutions to help their products meet the specification.
